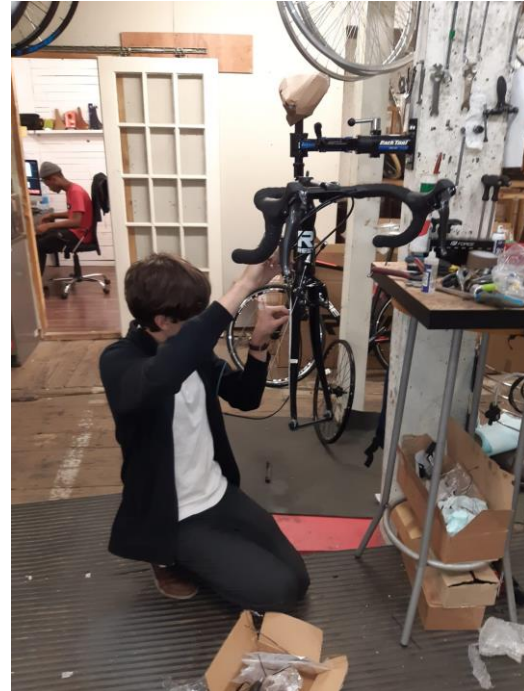

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Aims

Aim of our project is to organise high quality internships and school visits in other European countries, through which our students can, on the one hand, get to know the culture, working world or school system in another European country and on the other hand expand their personal, professional and social competences. Furthermore, group activities can be carried out involving joint activities with pupils from partner schools abroad. For staff, the programme offers some educational opportunities, such as attending courses, job shadowing or teaching at partner institutions. These activities improve the quality of education in the schools and support internationalisation efforts. With the help of the programme, participating schools should actively promote inclusion and diversity, including linguistic diversity, environmental sustainability and digital education.



HOW TO TAKE PART

The Erasmus coordinators are the first point of contact for both- students and staff. They present the programme and the different opportunities in parents' evenings, in the teaching staff and in the classes. They support the teachers in preparing the students, who want to participate in the programme as well as in organising the activities. School staff is supported by the programme in professional development, networking, cross-border cooperation and the use of innovative practices in teaching and school development.

PREPARATION

For students on short or long-term stays, linguistic, cultural and educational preparation is very important to ensure a successful stay abroad. Students learn to use the Europass tools, take an online language test, learn about the culture and way of life of their chosen country and learn about entry formalities. For long-term stays, they take part in the Erasmus National Agency's Pre Departure Training.



Activities

FOR STUDENTS

Group mobilities: A group of students accompanied by their teachers visits a school abroad for projects and collaborative learning. (2-30days)

Short term mobility: Students go abroad to study or for a workexperience. (10-29days)

Long term mobility: Its the same as short term but for longer (30-365days)

FOR STAFF

Structured courses: Attending a course abroad (2-30days)

Job shadowing: At a school or institution abroad (2-60days)

Lectures: Expert teachers go abroad for teaching (2-365days)

FROM ABROAD

Invited experts: Experts for special topics can be invited (2-60days)

Teachers in training: Can come to the schools. (10-365Days)

FOLLOW UP

Evaluation meetings with the student participants of long-and short term mobilities from all schools are important for follow up work as well as for quality control. These meetings end with a public presentation in order to prove the progress in learning, sociability, civic and cultural awareness and communication skills. A special focus, however, lies on personality building forces such as enthusiasm, growing independence and increased self-confidence.
